What is a curriculum evaluation?

Curriculum evaluations report on the quality of teaching and learning in specific subjects of the *Primary School Curriculum (1999)* and the *Primary Language Curriculum (2019)*. They affirm good practice and make recommendations, where appropriate, to aid the further development of the subject in the school.

How to read this report

During this inspection, the inspector(s) evaluated learning and teaching in Social Personal and Health Education (SPHE) under the following headings:

- 1. Quality of pupils' learning
- 2. Supporting pupils' learning through learner experiences and teachers' practice
- 3. The effectiveness of school planning, including SSE, in progressing pupils' learning

Inspectors describe the quality of each of these areas using the Inspectorate's quality continuum which is shown on the final page of this report. The quality continuum provides examples of the language used by inspectors when evaluating and describing the quality of the school's provision in each area.

The board of management of the school was given an opportunity to comment on the findings and recommendations of the report; the board chose to accept the report without response.

School context

Bunscoil McAuley Rice is a mixed, vertical primary school situated in Callan town and is under the patronage of the Catholic Bishop of Ossory. At the time of the evaluation the school comprised seventeen mainstream class teachers, six special education teachers (SET) and one administrative principal; it had an enrolment of 416 pupils.

Summary of main findings and recommendations:

Findings

- The quality of the pupils' learning and learning experiences was very good overall; they enjoyed their learning in Social, Personal and Health Education (SPHE).
- The pupils were motivated to achieve as learners and were very respectful, attentive and courteous to each other and their teachers during lessons.
- School management and teachers ensured that a very positive school climate and atmosphere was created; they carefully planned the presentation of the school building which provides an excellent, vibrant and aesthetically pleasing environment which the pupils thoroughly enjoy.
- Overall, the quality of teachers' individual and collective practice was very good; teachers
 prepared very well for their lessons which included high quality resources and a range of
 effective approaches and methodologies.
- The quality of school planning, including school self-evaluation (SSE), in progressing pupils' learning in SPHE was very good.
- The leadership provided by the principal for SPHE is very effective; he has supported teachers to engage in reflection and to participate in a wide range of professional development courses and facilitated opportunities and structures for teachers to share their learning.

Recommendations

As a means of further developing pupils' understanding and use of language in SPHE it
is recommended that teachers make explicit provision for key vocabulary in planning and
teaching; during the next review of the SPHE plan the in-school management team should
delineate the language to be taught per year level for each topic.

Detailed findings and recommendations

1. The quality of pupils' learning

The quality of the pupils' learning was very good overall. For the most part, it was evident that the pupils enjoyed their learning in SPHE and learning in this area significantly contributed to the pupils' overall sense of wellbeing. They were motivated to achieve as learners and were very respectful, attentive and courteous to each other and their teachers during lessons. In the pupil focus-group discussion all pupils reported that they enjoy their lessons and learning. The pupils demonstrated good knowledge and understanding of key aspects of the programme commensurate with their age, ability and class level. In particular, the pupils could listen to each other and respect different points of view. A deep knowledge of themselves as unique individuals

was also in evidence during classroom visits. The pupils had a good understanding of how to remain safe within their homes, school and community and discussed a range of strategies to implement in the event of bullying. Their ability to apply their learning to other aspects of the curriculum and to real life contexts was particularly praiseworthy. In a small number of instances, some pupils showed scope for development in terms of using and understanding subject specific language for SPHE. Some high quality samples of the pupils' writing and work in the visual arts that related to themselves and the world around them were on display in classrooms and communal areas of the school.

During classroom visits the pupils displayed competence in a range of skills; they co-operated and communicated very well with each other. They appreciated and respected the diversity that exists within the school community and the positive contributions of various cultural and social groups which has been successfully supported by the school's involvement in the Schools of Sanctuary Ireland programme.

2. Supporting pupils' learning: Learner experience and teachers' practice

The quality of the pupils' learning experience was very high. School management and teachers carefully planned the presentation of the school building which provides an excellent, vibrant and aesthetically pleasing environment which the pupils thoroughly enjoy. A very positive school climate and atmosphere was evident which supported health and wellbeing, nurtured self-confidence and self-worth and promoted respectful and caring relationships throughout the school. It was evident that the pupils' experiences in SPHE were significantly enhanced by participation in very effective lessons and a wide range of programmes such as the Green Schools, Active School Flag and Friends for Life programmes. The school has fostered very good links with the local community which successfully contributed to the pupils' learning experiences; it has worked with the GAA and its Five Star Programme for developing confidence and wellbeing in pupils and the local youth service to support transitions for sixth class pupils.

Overall, teachers' individual practice was very successful. Teachers demonstrated very effective classroom management skills and created very supportive and visually-attractive learning environments for SPHE. They used a variety of methodologies including whole-class teaching, pair work, group work, information and communications technology (ICT), story and Music. Very high quality resources were evident in lessons; teachers used pictures, photographs, presentations, concrete resources and artefacts skilfully. In general, the structure and pace of lessons was very effective. In a small number of lessons there was over use of teacher-directed approaches and whole-class teaching and questioning. In these instances, some pupils became disengaged and the focus of the lesson was compromised. All teachers should promote opportunites for more active learning at regular intervals in lessons to ensure that all the pupils are actively engaged. All teachers prepared to a very high standard. Plans, which were completed on a consistent basis, included specific learning objectives and a range of methodologies. To build on this effective practice, teachers should plan specific SPHE language and make this language explicit throughout the teaching of lessons.

Teachers have worked proactively to engage in professional learning that enhances provision in SPHE. The principal has supported teachers to engage in reflection and participate in a wide range of professional development courses. He has facilitated opportunities and structures for teachers to share their learning in SPHE through discussion at staff meetings and the sharing of material on a central folder on the school's ICT system. Leadership for aspects of the SPHE programme is delegated to specific members of the school staff, each of these teachers very effectively play a crucial role in upskilling their colleagues in their specific area of responsibility.

Overall, the quality of assessment in SPHE was of a good standard. All teachers made good use of questioning techniques to check for understanding. They circulated the room throughout inclass activities to observe pupils and copybooks were carefully monitored.

3. The effectiveness of school planning, including SSE, in progressing pupils' learning

The quality of school planning, including SSE, in progressing pupils' learning in SPHE was very good. The comprehensive whole-school plan guided teachers' planning and made provision for a broad and balanced programme in SPHE. It was contextualised to the needs of the school and reflected whole school decisions for the delivery of the curriculum. It provided useful guidance to teachers in relation to the content to be taught over a two-year period including provision for the various initiatives such as *Walk Tall*, *Stay Safe* and *Relationships and Sexuality Education* (RSE). The SPHE plan is due for review in 2022/2023. As a means of supporting teachers in the planning for, and teaching of, specific language in SPHE it is recommended that school management extends the whole school plan to make the key vocabulary and language within SPHE more explicit per topic for each class level.

At the time of the evaluation, the school had identified wellbeing as a focus for SSE and has commenced the process in this regard.
