### School context

Coláiste Mhuire, Johnstown, is a co-educational school under the auspices of Kilkenny-Carlow Education and Training Board, with an enrolment of 634 students. It has a broad post-primary curriculum and currently offers, Business Studies at junior cycle, transition year (TY) Accounting and Enterprise and Senior Cycle Accounting and Business. The school participates in Delivering Equality of Opportunity in Schools (DEIS), the action plan of the Department of Education for educational inclusion.

# Summary of main findings and recommendations:

#### Findings

- The overall quality of teaching, learning and assessment was very good.
- Provision for business subjects is very good and is well supported by timetabling and subject option arrangements.
- Team teaching was highly effective in the lessons observed.
- The overall quality of planning for the subject was very good with highly effective use of the Visual Learning Environment (VLE) to support positive learner outcomes and experiences.
- A highly effective action plan was developed for business subjects which enhanced the quality of subject planning and was linked with the whole school approach to DEIS planning.

#### Recommendations

- There is scope to further develop the overall TY business module by incorporating a rotating module of Business, Accounting and Economics to assist students to make informed decisions on senior cycle subject options.
- Modelling of students' work should be developed further to provide opportunities to view exemplars of students' work and engage in constructive feedback, assessment and peer assessment.

# **Detailed findings and recommendations**

# 1. Teaching, learning and assessment

- The overall quality of teaching learning and assessment was very good.
- In some lessons highly effective use of learning intentions was noted. Learning
  intentions were presented at the outset of all lessons and time was taken to discuss the
  intentions and progress reviewed. When the intentions were suitably differentiated,
  students were challenged to go beyond the tasks set for the class. Highly effective
  practice was also noted when the planned learning intentions were revisited to assess
  students' learning and affirm understanding.
- Highly effective practice was observed in all lessons where the teacher placed a strong emphasis on the development of the students' literacy and numeracy skills in line with whole school DEIS targets. This was further demonstrated by teachers identifying key words and taking appropriate opportunities to identify and promote financial literacy.
- Highly effective learning was noted when teachers provided a variety of teaching and assessment strategies to meet the individual needs of students. These strategies supported appropriate expectations and challenge for learners across the ability range.
- In keeping with very good practice student participation in classroom activities was monitored closely by teachers. Good circulation by teachers among the students improved the students' levels of engagement. Teachers provided one-to-one support to students when necessary which facilitated oral feedback being provided where appropriate.
- There was good use of questioning in all lessons. Very effective practice was noted when higher-order questioning strategies were used. This type of questioning had a beneficial impact on developing students' understanding. Furthermore, students were active in their own learning through questioning. Additionally, it was good that adequate wait time was provided to allow students to think before answering.
- Effective use of digital learning technologies (DLT) was observed in all lessons. A
  variety of well selected DLT resources was used. These resources included a range of
  worksheets, online assessment tools and presentations, all of which enhanced the
  quality of teaching, learning and assessment. In one lesson, highly effective practice
  was noted in the use of VLE to enable teachers and students to collaborate and share
  work.
- On the schools VLE, teachers provided opportunities for students to access notes and homework. There is potential to expand this to provide opportunities for students to note make and not just note take and to place the notes onto the platform. This will reduce time spent transcribing in lessons and would improve learning within the lesson.
- Effective group work was observed in almost all lessons where students worked in a collaborative manner and this had a positive impact on their learning.
- There was evidence of modelling of students work in some lessons. For example, the
  use of the VLE in a few lessons provided opportunities to view exemplars of students'
  work and engage in constructive feedback, assessment and peer assessment. This
  approach was highly effective and should be developed further to allow students to view
  a piece of work,engage in active constructive feedback through peer discussion and
  improve student understanding of the topic.

- Students' participation in classroom activities was monitored closely by teachers; good circulation among the students improved the participation level. Teachers provided one-to-one support to students when needed.
- Team teaching was highly effective in lessons observed, with seamless transitions between teachers, this highly effective practice should be further extended across the business department.
- Homework was assigned in all lessons during the evaluation and there was evidence from student journals that homework is allocated regularly. As many class groups are mixed ability, teachers should give consideration to providing differentiated homework.

# 2. Subject provision and whole school support

- The quality of subject provision and whole-school support was very good. School management is supportive of the subject and timetabling of the subject across all years and programmes is very good.
- Business Studies is an options' group subject which is delivered as a six-week subject sample model in first year. Business and Accounting are offered at senior cycle and Enterprise is offered in TY. The Business module within the TY programme should be reviewed in order to provide students with an opportunity to sample all three subjects. This will improve their ability to make informed decisions on senior cycle subject options.
- Students have open access to levels and change of levels is accommodated by following whole-school procedures; the number of students studying Business at higher level in recent years has increased at Senior Cycle.
- The business department has full access to a bank of mobile digital devices. The use of such resources is actively promoted by senior management.
- Team teaching is in place across the business department and is highly effective in improving learner outcomes and experiences. Teachers have planned well for team teaching and regularly reflect on the process.
- Enterprise education is valued in the school with recent involvement in the Local Enterprise awards. Students are encouraged and supported to participate in Enterprise activities by senior management.

## 3. Planning and preparation

- The overall quality of planning for the subject was very good.
- Highly effective use of the VLE allows teachers to collaborate and share resources with one another. There is a high level of engagement and reflection in relation to the use of the VLE. Collaboration is reported as being very strong across the business department.
- The coordination of the subject is undertaken by a business teacher and it rotates. Formal subject department meetings are regularly held with agendas prepared and minutes recorded.
- A centralised school wide system relating to data regarding the number of students taking Business subjects in the certificate examinations and student attainment are reviewed annually against the national norms for the subject and compared at whole school level, in line with DEIS targets.

 Business teachers have actively engaged in recent subject specific Continuing Professional Development and most teachers are active members of their subject organisation, the Business Studies Teachers Association of Ireland. Following attendance at in-service, the business department are sharing professional learning and trialling new methodologies in classes which is highly effective practice.

The draft findings and recommendations arising out of this evaluation were discussed with the principal and subject teachers at the conclusion of the evaluation.
